**Catalogue Description**: Readings designed to ease the transition into reading authentic prose of major Latin authors.

**Prerequisites**: LAT 1215, or equivalent, with a grade of C or better.

About the Course: This course builds on the skills learned in the Beginning Latin sequence. This course focuses on improving reading proficiency with continuous Latin prose passages. We will begin with selections from Livy's legends of early Rome, then read selections from the letters of Pliny the Younger, and spend the second half of the semester reading from Caesar's Gallic War. There will be reviews of grammatical forms and constructions throughout the semester to reinforce essential knowledge and skills. By the end of the semester students should be able to demonstrate increased fluency in reading Latin texts, distinguish and explain various grammatical constructions, and better appreciate Latin literature.

# **Emergency Protocols**

During an emergency, there are official university procedures that will maximize your safety.

**Severe Weather:** If you receive an OU Alert to seek refuge or hear a tornado siren that signals severe weather.

Look for severe weather refuge location maps located inside most OU buildings near the entrances

<u>Seek</u> refuge inside a building. Do not leave one building to seek shelter in another building that you deem safer. If outside, get into the nearest building.

<u>Go</u> to the building's severe weather refuge location. If you do not know where that is, go to the lowest level possible and seek refuge in an innermost room. Avoid outside doors and windows.

Get in, Get Down, Cover Up

Wait for official notice to resume normal activities.

#### **Armed Subject/Campus Intruder:**

If you receive an OU Alert to shelter-in-place due to an active shooter or armed intruder situation or you hear what you perceive to be gunshots:

- 1. *Avoid*: If you believe you can get out of the area WITHOUT encountering the armed individual, move quickly towards the nearest building exit, move away from the building, and call 911.
- 2. *Deny*: If you cannot flee, move to an area that can be locked or barricaded, turn off lights, silence devices, spread out, and formulate a plan of attack if the shooter enters the room.
- 3. *Defend*: As a last resort fight to defend yourself.

Shots Fired on Campus Procedure - Video

#### Fire Alarm/General Emergency:

If you receive an OU Alert that there is danger inside or near the building, or the fire alarm inside the building activates:

- 1. LEAVE the building. Do not use the elevators.
- 2. KNOW at least two building exits
- 3. ASSIST those that may need help
- 4. PROCEED to the emergency assembly area
- 5. ONCE safely outside, NOTIFY first responders of anyone that may still be inside building due to mobility issues.
- 6. WAIT for official notice before attempting to re-enter the building.
